HIGHLIGHTS:

- Interview relates entirely to the loss of treaty status by this particular family.

Ernest: What is your name?

Antoinette: Antionette Auger.

Ernest: How old are you?

Antoinette: About seventy-three years old.

Ernest: Where were you born?

Antoinette: Wabasca.

Ernest: Have you lived in this community long?

Antoinette: Quite a while.

Ernest: Where are you originally from?

Antoinette: I was raised in Wabasca since I was a child, both my sister and I. Our grandmother raised us. We travelled from place to place when my mother died. I must've been around four or five years old then. We winterized along the Wabasca river when my father was trapping. My grandmother took care of us, my father's mother.

Ernest: Where did your parents use to live?

Antoinette: They used to live at Wabasca, long ago, across the lake from where they call Stoney Point. That was where we lived.

Ernest: When treaty was first signed where did your parents live at the time?

Antoinette: I don't know that, I don't recall when the treaty was made.

Ernest: Are you treaty at the present time?

Antoinette: No, I'm not a treaty, we got thrown out of treaty.

Ernest: But you came from Wabasca, that's where you have lived before.

Antoinette: Yes, that's where we were before. That's where we were born.

Ernest: Could you tell me why you are not treaty right now?

Antoinette: I don't know why we are not treaty. We were no longer treaty all of a sudden. We didn't get any treaty money.

Ernest: Was your father treaty?

Antoinette: I don't remember if he was a treaty.

Ernest: Did any of his relatives were treaty?

Antoinette: Yes, his relations were treaty. Two of his brothers are treaty, my in-laws were also treaty.

Ernest: What are their names?

Antoinette: Baptiste Auger and Samuel Auger.

Ernest: Where were they registered?

Antoinette: They're from Wabasca too.

Ernest: Are they still registered there?

Antoinette: I don't know, their children are living here.

Ernest: Where is that reserve?

Antoinette: Samuel Auger's children are over at John D'Or but Baptiste Auger's children are at the reserve.

Ernest: Is he the only one who's not treaty?

Antoinette: I guess he's the only one.

Ernest: All his relations were treaty.

Antoinette: Yes.

Ernest: Where was he registered?

Antoinette: I don't really know, I guess at Wabasca. They used to live around Trout Lake.

Ernest: What's his name?

Antoinette: His name was Sol Auger.

Ernest: Well, I don't have anything else I could ask you unless you have any more you want to tell me, if you remember something else.

Antoinette: No, I don't. I can't remember any more I can say, I've told you all I can remember. Now my children regret they are not treaty. Especially my sons, they really would want to be treaty.

Ernest: I really appreciate what you have told me. This will be all now.
