**H**ERITAGE LECTURE SERIES  
"LOOKING BACK AT SASKATCHEWAN'S FIRST CENTURY: FIVE EVENTS THAT HAVE SHAPED OUR PROVINCE"

Speaker: Professor William Brennan, Department of History

Professor Brennan, who teaches courses in Western Canadian and Saskatchewan history at the U of R, says important turning points have shaped our province's history and self-image over the past century. The most commonly cited events include the two world wars, the Great Depression of the 1930s and the introduction of medicare in 1962. However, Brennan believes there are other equally significant but lesser known events that have had a long-lasting impact on Saskatchewan, and have changed our province in significant ways.

"I'll be talking about what historians think about some of these turning points, and I'll be giving my own take on them," Brennan says. "Different people will have differing opinions about these events and their relative importance, and I hope that will produce questions and discussion from people in the audience."

"During this Centennial Year, we as a province haven't taken a hard look at where we've come from and where we're going," Brennan continues. I hope this lecture will be an opportunity for people to look back at some of these significant events."

## Online option replaces standing in line

U of R students can now pay their tuition, residence and other fees online using a secure payment option. Because the online option is available at any time of the day or night, the University's Financial Services staff expect to see fewer and shorter lineups when students have to settle their accounts.

"Students have to pay their fees at the beginning of each semester," explains Dale Schoffer, the U of R's director/associate vice-president of finance. "September and January are the busiest months for our staff, and we have to add more staff to handle the volume of students."

Under the new system students can check the balance owing on their accounts at a secure, dedicated area of the U of R website, and then make payments from their bank account or charge the payment to their Visa or Mastercard account. American Express will soon be added to the list of payment options.

"Besides reducing lineups, we have many students teaching or doing social work practicums outside Regina, and co-op students on work terms," Schoffer says. "They can pay their fees from distant locations, without going to the University. It will be as convenient and secure as paying any utility bill over the Internet."

Besides being more convenient for students and improving customer service, Schoffer says the new system reduces administrative costs for the University, as automated processes credit students' accounts and deposit payments in the University's bank account. However, one large hurdle remains in the effort to automate all student

fee payment processes.

"Students who depend on student loans to pay their fees must still bring their loan forms to Financial Services so our staff can verify their course enrolments and the fees outstanding," Schoffer explains. "The student then takes the loan form to their financial institution, where the fees are forwarded to the University. We want to automate this process so these students do not have to stand in line," he continues.

"This project is much more complicated, as it requires co-ordinating computer systems at the University, Saskatchewan Student Loans and the financial institutions. Still, we're hopeful that we'll be able to introduce such a system so that all students will be able to pay their fees 24-7."

## FACES ON CAMPUS

**H**aving played university hockey for four seasons, and having taught for five years, Cougars' hockey coach Blaine Sautner is a strong believer that athletes should get a good education. Combining university studies with hockey is "the best of both worlds", says

Sautner, who became head coach of the men's team in June.

"They are student-athletes, and the student part comes first," Sautner states. "They don't play unless their grades are at a certain level. Working hard at school and working hard at hockey usually go hand in hand, so it's like teamwork on and off the ice."

Sautner came to the U of R after four years as head coach and general manager of the North Battleford North Stars of the Saskatchewan Junior Hockey League (SJHL). Prior to that he taught full-time and worked as an assistant coach with the SJHL's Flin Flon Bombers.

"I left teaching to coach full-time with the goal of moving up to the CIS (Canadian Interuniversity Sport) level because I believe players should also get an education."

Despite a late start in recruiting players, Sautner is satisfied with the season his Cougars have put together so far. He's also already thinking about next season's student-athletes.

"The players know this is a good place to come to play, and to learn. The best salesmen for your program are your own players," he says.
