Student Supports Planned Giving

"We make a living by what we get. We make a life by what we give," observed Sir Winston Churchill. If so, then U of R employee and student Martin Callaghan has made an emphatic statement about his life. Callaghan, who has completed the requirements for his bachelor of science degree in geography and is close to completing his B.Sc in biology, has arranged to make a \$1.1 million planned gift to the University's Building Dreams and Futures campaign. His planned gift will support the Department of Geography by contributing to equipment purchases, bursaries, and the department's areas of greatest need.

Callaghan, who dropped out of high school about 20 years ago, thought going to university was "too far out of my league." He suffered a serious back injury when he was living near Prince Albert, and during two years of physiotherapy in Regina, his therapists told him he should go to university. He applied, and began his studies at the University of Regina in the fall of 1999. He remembers how important it was to have people to talk to when he became frustrated or discouraged.

"I had support from people, which was very different," says Callaghan. "I'd never had that before in my life. I'd never met people like that before."

Callaghan is working full-time for the U of R as field co-ordinator for water quality in the Qu'Appelle Valley watershed while he completes his degree in biology. He describes himself as very fortunate to be where he is today, and with prospects for an even brighter future.

"If it wasn't for a very small group of people who were very supportive, I wouldn't have made it this far. Everything I've done," he says, "is really their doing. Some have moved on, and some I've lost touch with, but they know who they are. My gift is one way I can acknowledge what they did for me."

Callaghan's planned gift gives a timely boost to the recent announcement by new U of R President Robert Hawkins that the University intends to raise an additional \$25 mil-

lion in its Building Dreams and Futures campaign by asking individuals to include the U of R in their estate plans. The announcement raises the University's fundraising goal from \$75 million to \$100 million. Hawkins also announced that the several donors have committed a total of more than \$8 million in planned gifts to the University.
