**Turnitin**

The University of Regina has purchased a license for [Turnitin](#), a service that provides a number of useful features for students, faculty and other instructors who are dealing with written assignments.

The Centre for Teaching and Learning, in conjunction with Information Services, is leading Turnitin training at the University of Regina and facilitating pedagogically based discussions. These discussions aim to assist faculty and other instructors with the basics of Turnitin. In each session you'll learn how to create a profile, navigate the instructor homepage, create classes and assignments, enroll students, submit papers, and how to manage assignments and students. You'll learn about Originality Check and how to navigate and interpret originality reports, learn about Grade Mark and how to add comments and feedback on a paper, as well as how to create and use rubrics. **Watch [CTL Events](#) for details about fall Turnitin sessions.**

**Library Instruction Program**

The University of Regina Library offers an extensive library instruction program. Teaching faculty can request instruction sessions for their courses by contacting their [subject liaison librarian](#). Many faculty members already take advantage of the library instruction program and note significant improvements in the quality of student research in their courses as a result; this anecdotal finding is supported by many studies in the literature (for example, Craig and Corral 2007; Emmett and Emde 2007; Ferrer-Vinent and Carello 2008).

Topics covered range from specific search tools to more conceptual sessions on analyzing an information need, constructing a search strategy, evaluating information sources, and ethical use of information. Instruction sessions can be delivered in a library computer lab, in your classroom, or online using Adobe Connect.

We put a lot of work into our teaching and liaison librarian instruction schedules fill quickly, so we do require two weeks notice prior to your preferred instruction date. Contact your librarian as soon as possible to book your session for Fall 2012 to avoid disappointment!

## Information Matters

Archives & Special Collections in the University Library is leading the development and implementation of a university-wide records and information management program. As the program moves forward, all university units will be engaged in the process of creating record schedules and implementing procedures to manage their active and semi-active records.

### The Records Management Partnership

All University Board members, administrators, faculty and staff have a role in the records management partnership. The institution's [Records and Information Management Policy](#) outlines the following roles and responsibilities:

#### Board of Governors:

- approve the Records and Information Management Policy.
- designate the Head of Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy.

#### Head of Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy:

- oversees the adoption of record-keeping and disclosure practices consistent with the University's Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Policy and *The Local Authority Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act*.

#### Senior Administrators, Deans and Directors:

- ensure compliance with the Records & Information Management Policy and associated procedures.
- designate an individual in his/her faculty or office to serve as a Designated Records Officer.

#### Designated Records Officers:

- provide leadership and support to record creators and keepers in their faculty/office in the area of records and information management.
- liaise with Archives & Special Collections faculty and staff on the development, implementation and enforcement of approved procedures and guidelines.

#### University Board Members, Faculty and Staff:

- create and maintain university records with consideration to legislative, business and accountability requirements and in accordance with an approved records schedule.
- dispose of inactive university records as prescribed by an approved records schedule.
- transfer university records to their successors and/or Archives & Special Collections when they leave or relinquish their positions.

#### Archives & Special Collections Faculty and Staff:

- provide direction to all areas and levels of the University concerning records and information management standards. This includes policy and procedure development and review, training, and cooperative design of records schedules and best practices.
- maintain and preserve university records of archival value that have been transferred to the Archives' care in accordance with approved records schedules and associated procedures. Access to these records is governed by *The Local Authority Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act*.

#### University Records and Information Management Committee (URIMC):

- reviews and approves all records schedules.

## Featured Database

The month's featured database is [PressDisplay](#). *PressDisplay* provides online access to more than 1700 of today's newspapers from 92 countries in 48 languages in full-color, full-page format and has up to a 60 day archive.

There is a reason that the Library is featuring this database again. Four of Canada's highest-profile newspapers (Ottawa Citizen, Vancouver Province, Vancouver Sun, and National Post) have added a paywall, asking readers to pay for the content they read online. The papers will charge 99 cents a month for full access to the site and iPad apps. After the first month the cost will increase to \$7.95/month or \$79.50/year. Lucky for University of Regina students, faculty, and staff the Archer Library subscribes to *PressDisplay*, which contains all of the above newspapers for free. You can read more about the paywalls in [The Globe and Mail](#).

*PressDisplay* has developed a new site that provides readers with comprehensive SmartNavigation. Retaining convenient search and bookmarking tools, these advanced digital features are built on *PressDisplay's* existing technology. SmartNavigation now also provides readers with a traditional 2-page newspaper view, table of contents, article jumps (linking article sections) and easy to read text views.
