Dr. John Archer Library Award

The Dr. John Archer Library Award was introduced in Winter Semester 2012. The annual \$1,000 award is applicable only to full-time undergraduate students at the University of Regina and the three federated colleges (Campion College, First Nations University of Canada, and Luther College). Applications must successfully demonstrate written evidence of significant inquiry using the University of Regina Library's resources and services along with learning about the research and information gathering process for their research project. The reflective essay should be between 250 and 500 words for a graded assignment in a course completed within the last year.

Students must apply online using Student Awards and Financial Aid's (SAFA) Student Awards Management System (SAMS). Applications must be received by the annual Winter Semester deadline. There will be a private reception in the Library for the winner. The University Librarian presents a certificate and a photo opportunity will also take place with representatives from the student's faculty and the library award trophy. The student's name will be engraved on a plaque and her/his face will be featured on the next award's promotional material. All faculties are encouraged to motivate students to apply and promotional material is available upon request. Preserving Our Heritage

Black/African Canadian History Month, Talk by Carol LaFayette-Boyd a descendant of freed slaves from Virginia who settled in Saskatchewan in 1906.

Her great grandfather, Edward LaFayette was a descendent of freed slaves in Virginia. He travelled to Iowa in 1870 and his son, Carol's grandfather, Lewis LaFayette who was born in Iowa left in 1906, arriving in Regina with his wife Lillie, son Earnest and brother Goldie. Her father was born in Regina in 1907. Lewis LaFayette began homesteading near Fiske, Saskatchewan and moved the family there in 1911. Her Mother's family came to Canada from Oklahoma in 1910. Carol was born on a farm near McGee in 1942

Carol has been active with the [Saskatchewan African Canadian Heritage Museum \(SACHM\) board](#) since 2005. Carol is a wife, mother of two, grandmother of three, great grandmother of one, sister to seven, niece, aunt & cousin to many. She trained as a psychiatric nurse and is a registered social worker. Carol retired in 2005 after 33 years with the Saskatchewan Government in Social Services and Corrections and Public Safety. She is a Masters track and field athlete having taken up competition in 1992. She is a member of the Canadian Masters Athletics Hall of Fame. Carol is the family historian and has been working on their genealogy since 1982
