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The picture shows the proposed layout of part of the Regina Campus, University of Saskatchewan, once it is established on a new site in south Regina. This area would be known as the "academic complex" (primarily buildings in which classes are held).

According to this plan, drawn up by Minoru Yamasaki, master planner for the Wascana Centre of which the university is a part, the dominant feature in the area would be a library. This is represented on the plan by the building at left which has a circular effect to the roof. Buildings in the foreground are designed for classes, and offices and there is also provision for a small auditorium for student activities. The other buildings will serve various teaching functions.

Locations of some of the buildings as shown in the picture will likely be changed, but for the present the way they are arranged provides a useful guide to future development. As university officials say "a master plan is accepted as a basic philosophy for building, rather than a definite plan."

Yamasaki has proposed that the Regina Campus be laid out in three separate sections. Development will be undertaken as enrolment warrants and finances permit and is designed to serve 8,000 students which could take some 40 years. The first building will be ready for occupancy in the fall of 1964 when 1,200 students are expected to be in attendance.
