(ADVANCE)...REGINA, MAY 29 - Campion College, Regina, will become a federated arts college of the University of Saskatchewan.

Dr. W.A. Riddell, principal, Regina Campus, announced tonight at the Closing Exercises of Campion College High School that the Faculty Council and Senate of the University have approved the terms and conditions of federation, and the Board of Governors has set aside a building site for Campion in the academic area of the new Regina Campus. It is expected that federation will become effective and a new building will be erected by the fall, 1966. The only other arts college federated with the University is St. Thomas More, Saskatoon.

Campion is now a junior college of the University, offering classes in first year arts and science. As an undergraduate federated arts college, it will offer in co-operation with the College of Arts and Science, Regina Campus, various courses leading to the bachelor of arts degree. The University will confer the degree on students of Campion who have satisfied the requirements prescribed for admission and for the bachelor of arts curriculum.

The teaching staff at Campion, from full time lecturers upward, will become members of the Regina Campus Faculty Council, and those giving classes recognized for the bachelor of arts degree will become members of the College of Arts and Science. In addition, the rector of Campion will sit on the University Senate.

The University will recognize instruction given by Campion in classics, economics, English, French, history, philosophy, psychology and sociology, as well as in any other subjects that may later be agreed on.

Campion College was established by the Jesuit Fathers in 1918, and in 1922 the first building was opened at the present location. It became a junior college after the University Senate in 1924 adopted a policy of recognizing classes of the first year of arts and science in institutions whose equipment and instruction met University standards.
