






Friday 3 October, **Dr Angelina Baydala (PSYC)** was external examiner for a doctoral defense at York University ... the candidate, Leeat Granek, successfully defended her dissertation entitled "Bottled Tears: The Pathologization, Psychologization, and Privatization of Grief' ... the Department of International Languages recently facilitated a visit to our University by representatives of Kyoto Koka Women's University ... a memorandum of agreement was signed by President Timmons and Toshiyuki Abe, Chairman of Kyoto Koka's board of trustees ... on 4 and 5 October, in connection with the visit and with the support of the Faculty of Arts, the Faculty of Fine Arts, the Japan Foundation, and the Consulate General of Japan, two performances of the ancient art of Japanese sung theater referred to as "Noh" were held in the Shu-box Theatre with an overflowing crowd on each day ... the main performer, Master Kawamura, and his two fellow artists expressed their appreciation for the professionalism and hospitality of all who received them ... Gerry Hill (Luther/ENGL) gave a reading at the Winnipeg International Writers Festival, 24-25 September ... on 15 September Dr Regan Shercliffe (Luther/PSYC) gave a presentation entitled "Settlement of Karen Refugees" at the Prairie Metropolis Centre (A Centre of Excellence for Research on Immigration, Integration and Diversity) Research Symposium ... Shercliffe has also received funding in the amount of \$7061 for his project entitled "Validation of the Karen Depression Scale (KDS)" from the Prairie Metropolis Centre Adjudication Committee and Board of Governors ... on 8 and 9 October, in collaboration with the Department of Sociology & Social Studies and the Johnson-Shoyama Graduate School of Public Policy, the Department of French offered two presentations by renowned sociologist and scholar Guy

Rocher (University of Montréal) on the topic "Québec's language wars: then and now" ... on 12 November at Carleton University in Ottawa, **Dr William Arnal** (**RLST**) (pictured at right) will deliver the Edgar and Dorothy Davidson Lecture, entitled "What Branches Grow Out of This Stony Rubbish: How 'the Bible' Can Add To – And Subtract From – The Study of Religion" ... the Davidson Lecture "brings a prominent scholar in religious studies and related areas to Carleton" ... previous Davidson lecturers include William Chittick, Nino Ricci, and Alan Segal ... **Dr Darlene Juschka (WMST/RLST)** has published "Deconstructing the Eliadian Paradigm: Symbol" in Braun and McCutcheon (eds.), Introducing Religion: Essays in Honour of I Z Smith (London and Oakville: Equinox, 2008: 163-177) ... **Dr**



Viktoriya Galushko (ECON) has joined the Canadian Agricultural Innovation research Network (CAIRN), a network of 24 researchers with the objective of enhancing the understanding of agricultural innovation and developing innovation-related public policy ... a committee was struck to organize a CAIRN workshop in December to be attended by university researchers, policy makers and industry participants, and Dr Galushko will serve on this committee ... on 7 October Dr Galushko interviewed a



pulse breeder from the University of Saskatchewan regarding the performance of the current variety release system, the hindrances to new variety development in the pulse industry, and the impact of increasing intellectual property rights on pulse breeding research ... also in ECON, **Dr Richard Martin** (pictured at left) conducted a congestion experiment the week of 22 September with U of R students at the University of Regina ... in congestion games, a subject's payoff is higher when their choice is less popular ... for example, consider making a trip in a large city ... if there are multiple equivalent

route options, the best route would be the one with the smallest number of other travelers ... the experiment investigated the influence of feedback information and stakes (rewards) on the efficiency of outcomes ... it turned out that feedback information did not influence efficiency in the experiment, which calls into question the value of traffic reporting via radio and Dynamic Message Signs ...
